In Say Nothing, he proposes deconstructing our digital habits, re-evaluating the flood of voices in our echo chambers and leaving space in our lives for silence in order to think.

Meanwhile, our leading authors continue to seduce readers here and abroad. **Gabrielle Filteau-Chiba** gained a loyal audience through her ecofeminist triptych as well as her latest novel, *Hexa*, a fable on filiation and sorority. An international bestseller translated into 20 languages, **Jocelyne Saucier**'s *And the Birds Rained Down* remains as fresh and relevant as ever. Regarding audiovisual rights, turn to beloved author Marie-Renée Lavoie, whose touching novel *Mister Roger and Me* is set for a 2024 theatrical release.

Mélisa doesn't understand what's happening to her. She seems to see things that other people don't, her childhood memories don't match with her parents', and her first crush, who had so harshly rejected her when they were teenagers, shows up from nowhere and declares his love for her. To understand what is happening in the present, the protagonist is sent spiraling through a flurry of fragments from the past into what becomes a kaleidoscope of sex, religion, money, violence, desire, memory, buried emotion, and disappointment—but what is real, and what isn't? Aren't our personalities constructed from grand illusions, deformed truths, and half-spoken lies?

Monica feels a deep connection to the work of the First Nations artist: something about the wound she carries is expressed on these canvases, in these installations.

Thus begins Monica's quest to reconnect with what defines her. But she must also heal from the past violence of intergenerational trauma, a child-hood uprooted from her culture, and relationships with toxic men. If she is to shed this baggage and return to Pessamit in peace, she will first need to meet with Indigenous women accross the continent to discuss the importance of passing on traditional arts and the power they hold for the next generation.


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Very few resources are available for people who want to try community living in an urban context. This book attempts to fill that gap by presenting the concept of cohousing as rooted in reality, as opposed to an idealistic or utopian vision.

The housing crisis won't be solved building new homes alone. because the issue goes beyond a lack of square footage. This complex problem must be approached as an ecological crisis combined with multiple social crises: an impoverished middle class, an aging population, a sense of isolation, and a concrete urban structure that promotes alienation. As a result, intentional communities represent an increasingly promising way forward. Community living allows residents to share individual strengths with the group while recreating a familiar model with a proven track record: a family chosen by its members.

GABRIELLE ANCTIL is a journalist and researcher specialized on the topics of sciences, and the environment, who contributes to a variety of media. In 2008, she co-founded a self-managed intentional community that nurtures and houses its members and their aspirations through knowledge sharing and resource pooling. She still lives there today and works to build a new way of living together.




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
